February 19 - 21 Campout: Wild Caving!

Scouts, here is your chance to journey to the center of the earth! Or at least Explore what lies beneath the canyon lands of Colorado Bend State Park. An experienced guide will lead us on a speleo-adventure through caves and caverns where you crawl, slide, and climb through small spaces and into large chambers. Be prepared to get dirty and maybe even soaked.

There are three different cave tours offered. Choose the one that is best suited for you.

Discovery: Come and explore roomy but wild Dynamite Cave. This cave features a walk-in entrance that is suitable for all ages and skill levels. No crawling necessary. (Unless you want to!) See ancient stalactites, stalagmites and flowstones while learning about the ecosystem of a Texas cave by experiencing it first hand. You can see daylight from almost everywhere in the cave: a great way to get used to the idea of being underground!



Adventure: Come and get a little bit dirty on our intermediate trip to Turtle Shell Cave. This trip takes you a little deeper underground than the Discovery Tour but it is a relaxed and easy expedition for anyone who is ready to do a little crawling! Recommended for Scouts under age 13. About 60 minutes underground.

Wild: Come and see what Colorado Bend caving is all about as we explore the Cicurina Cave, an extensive maze of crawl ways and caverns. Get ready to do a lot of crawling and a lot of getting dirty; an authentic Central Texas caving experience! Priority is given to the oldest scouts. About 90 minutes underground.

With rugged tent camping, cave crawling tours and the thunderous 60-foot Gorman Falls, your pulse will spend a lot of time racing on this Grand campout ... an experience not to be missed.

All Scouts and Scouters wishing to go WILD CAVING must secure their spot by <u>filling this form</u> and a deposit of \$25 by Monday, January 25 with the Troop Scribe. Total funding for Scouts must be received Monday, February 15, and is expected to be between \$56 and \$86 (depending on the cave tour chosen). Secure your spot today! Form at the end of this issue.

Summer Camp Merit Badge Sign-up Time

ALL second year and older Scouts attending Summer Camp this year will need to sign up for camp Merit Badge Classes. There are five sessions, and we are asking each Scout to provide three alternates in case a class(es) isn't available.

PLEASE COMPLETE THIS BY FEBRUARY 29TH.

The Program Guide at the end of this newsletter includes information on the offered Merit Badges. Note that some classes extend to two or more sessions.

SCOUTS: Please <u>fill out the form</u> on page 4 and DISCUSS WITH YOUR PATROL ADVISER. <u>The PA will review and approve selections and turn in their choices</u>. Selections added after February 29 may receive a lower priority for classes that fill up quickly or have class size limits.

Scouts should consider a mix of Eagle-required MBs and those requiring special equipment offered only at summer camp. Do not sign up for MBs offered often or easily through the Troop. Descriptions note those that can't be completed at camp. You may be required to complete some requirements before or after camp.

Beginning over the holiday break we have been working to solve several garage sale issues, and wanted to give everyone an update where we are. The two issues at hand, the impending loss of our FREE storage unit, and the loss of one of our Garage Sale Chairs.

We have several past Garage Sale chairs and volunteers to help out, but <u>we</u> <u>can use another volunteer to help with coordination</u>. In trying to keep any one committee member from wearing too many hats, <u>we're also seeking a new</u> <u>Clothing Closet volunteer to help once a month</u> with supplying our new Scout packets and others with patches, "experienced" uniforms and other things.

I'm asking all our parents and Scouters to help with the critical need to find a new storage location for our garage sale equipment as well as the large furniture and other donations that we receive between the two sales weekends. If you have or know of any place where we might contain these items please let me know. We need to move quickly, as we will need to be out of our current space before the end of January or pay to use the space, thus cutting back significantly on the profits from our sales that can be used to offset Summer Camp transportation and other expenses.

Decisions will need to be voted on at our next Troop Committee meeting on Feb 4. You are welcome to attend. We'll decide then whether we should do anything more to continue the garage sale or close it down. We'll also look at alternative fundraisers to possibly fill the void.

If we discontinue the garage sales, we would have no choice but to pass the additional summer camp expenses we normally cover on to the families. For anyone wanting to attend, Troop Committee meetings are always the first Thursday of the month, starting at 7:30 pm in the Resurrection Lutheran Chapel. You're welcome to reach out to Steve Miles or me with questions. I'll also be at the Troop Meeting on January 25 to answer questions.

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T1000 SUMMER CAMP 2016 - MERIT BADGE SIGN UP



Trevor Rees-Jones Scout Camp, Athens, Texas - June 19th thru 25th

NOTE: First Year Scouts (5th or 6th Graders in first year with Troop and who are not yet Second Class Scouts) do <u>NOT</u> need to fill out this form. You will attend a Trail to First Class program, and working on Second Class and First Class rank requirements. You will also be earning the Leatherwork and Basketry Merit Badges, and working on the Swimming and First Aid Merit Badges.

Each Scout may sign up for 5 <u>sessions</u>, some sessions teach more than one Merit Badge (such as Crime Prevention and Fingerprinting) and others take two sessions (such as Climbing). Please review the choices carefully, discuss these with your Patrol Adviser, and take note of the prerequisites and other qualifications that may be necessary. Many Merit Badge classes require the Scout to complete some requirements BEFORE arriving at camp or following camp, to complete the Merit badge.

Example:

Session Choice #1: Climbing	Session Choice #2: Climbing	Session Choice #3: Robotics
Session Choice #4: Archery	Session Choice #5: Hiking	

Scouts will need to bring their own Merit Badge Pamphlets with them for class instruction, and (optional) print off online Workbooks to help take notes. Used or PDF versions of MB Pamphlets may be available. Please contact your Patrol Adviser or ASM Steve Lavine to obtain these if you wish. Some sessions require kits that may be ordered in advance or have additional costs. We will contact you regarding how these are to be paid for (some in advance, others at camp).

Circle 10 kicks off Camp Cards on February 16. For those new to the troop, Camp Cards are \$5 cards that the Scouts can sell and earn \$2.50 for every camp card sold. This is put into their "bin" account to cover camp costs, especially summer camp. It's a wonderful way for Scouts to work on their sales skills while earning camp money! We had a fabulous camp card sale last year — over 2,300 sold by the troop. We aim to match that this year!

As before, each card will have multiple discounts, including a snap-off \$5 off \$50 Kroger purchase, and a snap-off \$10 off \$50 Dick's Sporting Good purchase. Scouts will again be able to get Camp Cards, in increments of 10, to sell on their own, and we will sign up for time slots to sell in front of both Krogers and Dick's Sporting Goods.

Bryan on Scouting's Most-Read Posts of 2015

Scouting magazine's <u>Bryan on Scouting blog</u> is written by Bryan Wendell, an Eagle Scout and senior editor of *Boys' Life*, *Scouting* and *Eagles' Call* magazines. If you haven't checked it out, give it a look as he talks about everything you can think of related to Scouting. Here is a round-up of the popular posts from 2015.

- What percentage of Boy Scouts become Eagle Scouts? You may have heard of the book, "Four Percent: The Story of Uncommon Youth in a Century of American Life." However, 4 percent is outdated. Here's what it is and what caused the change.
- <u>2014 Merit Badge Rankings</u>: Find out which Merit Badges were most and least popular. Obviously, the 13 Eagle-required Merit Badges are tops. Bryan covers Nos. 14 to 22 and the bottom 10. If you want to do one of the least popular, don't wait too long.
- <u>Scoutmaster wants to remove a certain four-letter word from Scouting</u>: It's most likely not anything you'd think. And we avoid using this word in *The Millennium*.
- <u>5 Tips for helping Scouts reach Eagle before time runs out</u>: We hope no Scout gets in this situation, but here are tips to help. The key is to do Family Life, Personal Fitness and Personal Management Merit Badges earlier as soon as a Scout is ready because these all require at least three months to complete (90 days, 12 weeks and 13 weeks). There's not getting around the time.
- An Eagle Scout project doesn't have to be permanent: Construction-based projects are
 wonderful and long-lasting. Plus, they make cool before-and-after photos. Still, there are many
 projects just as valuable that aren't construction-based. Pick up some good ideas.
