For our first Extended Campout of 2014, Troop 1000 will "take off" for the USS Lexington, where we have bunks on board reserved for two nights, March 9-10. For new and fairly new Scouts, This is often a "warmup" trip for summer camp. Not quite a week away from home, and comfortable bunks for at

least a few days of the trip!

Scouts will experience the fun aspects of living on an Aircraft Carrier including a ships tour, dining in the ships officers mess for meals (where they can order anything they want as long as that's the one thing being served that day), and learn about the haunted parts of this famous floating fortress.

Additional activities will include a visit to a local Science and History museum where replicas of Columbus' Ships are moored and can be toured. - a fascinating look back to 1492! Plans are underway to spend one night camping in a state park or Scout camp on the way down (by car) and an additional

night on a military base on the way back.

Reservations are still being accepted, but space is lim-

<u>ited</u>. Please use the attached reservation sheet to make your reservation TODAY and be sure to include your deposit.

Summer Camp:

Camp Buck Toms July 5-13

This will be Troop 1000's first visit to Tennessee's Smoky Mountains area Camp Buck Tom's (although our Scout master, Mr. Diamond, went to camp there as a Scout!). Camping will be in a unique bunk-bed style "open" cabin (called an Adirondack) - so no cots needed this year!

The camp offers "all the comforts" of a typical Scout Camp, plus some exciting surprises for all! For Second year and more experienced Scouts, merit badge class signup begins in early February, and all signups should be set up for non-first year Scouts by mid February. There are High Adventure Options for experienced Scouts.

Total cost (without merit badge fees and high adventure options) will be about \$300 to \$350 per scout (transportation cost is still a variable, although most is expected to be covered by the Troop's Garage Sale revenue).

<u>Deposit of \$100 is due on Feb</u> 10th.

NEEDED: NEW MERIT BADGE COUNSELORS

First you ask, what is a Merit Badge Counselor then you ask what is a Merit Badge?

Merit Badges are earned as part of your Scouts rank advancement once they reach First Class. The Scouts learn about sports, crafts, science, trades, business, and future careers by earning Merit Badges. In order for the Scouts to earn Merit Badges, they need to meet with the Merit Badge Counselor. The Merit Badge Counselor has special knowledge in their merit badge subjects and are interested in helping the Scouts.

At T1000, we try to give our Scouts access to all 133 Merit Badges by having in-Troop counselors. This just makes scheduling counselor time easier and allows the Scouts to meet different people that are associated with the Troop.

Of the 133 Merit Badges available, the Scouts are required to choose 13 required Merit

Badges from a selection of 17 and then 8 additional non required to earn Eagle. We like to have three to four counselors for each of the required badges and at least one counselor for the non required badges.

How do you become a Merit Badge Counselor? First, decide what Merit Badges you have an interest in counseling. Second, fill out an Adult Application and fill in the position code field with a 42. Third, you will need to fill out a Merit Badge Counselor Application form

(http://www.t1000.org/docs/mb counselorform.doc). And fourth is to take the Youth Protection online class from BSA. Then get this documentation to John Gnew at any Monday night meeting.

Please review our current list at http://www.t1000.org/docs/MB_Counselors.xls. Our immediate needs are to get the required Merit Badges covered and then fill in the rest

where you have expertise and can help out.

Looking for three to four counselors for the following Merit Badges:

- Cooking
- Cycling
- Sustainability

Looking for one to two additional counselors for:

- Citizenship in the Community/Nation/World
- Communications
- Family Life
- First Aid
- Lifesaving
- Personal Fitness
- Swimming.

MERIT BADGE PROCESS

GOSH, this looks complicated—but it really isn't—it just takes some getting used to.

First year Scouts will have their Merit Badges selected for them—First Aid & Swimming (both Eagle Required) are earned at Summer Camp. Additional Merit Badges, usually in the Crafts (Leatherwork, Wood Carving) may also be earned at Camp.

One a Scout achieves 1st Class he should be looking to add more Merit Badges to his Sash—he'll need several for his rank advancement to Star.

So, here's the process.

 Unless a desired MB is being offered soon by the troop, a Scout may select any merit badge he wishes to earn. It may be helpful for the Scout to see if there are other Scouts also interested in the MB so that a MB class can be formed.

- The Scout informs his Patrol Advisor (PA) of his desire to earn the badge. He will issue a "Blue Card" and assign the Scout a Merit Badge Counselor to work with. The PA may conduct a brief counseling interview with the Scout to determine if the merit badge is appropriate for the Scout at this point in time.
- The Scout should have the Blue Card with him for all Merit Badge related activities so that individual requirements may be signed off by the counselor.
- 4. The Scout contacts the

Merit Badge Counselor to establish a working schedule.

- Once all merit badge requirements have been met, the Counselor signs and dates the Application for Merit Badge and the Applicants Record sections of the Scouts Blue Card.
- The Scout MUST turn his merit badge completion in to the Troop Advancements Chairperson (Carolyn Linscott). The Chairperson updates the Scout's Handbook as required.
- The Scout should keep his copy of the Blue Card until he receives the 'official' MB card. He should keep the 'official' copy of the MB for ever – it is a must have for the Eagle package!

MERIT BADGE PAMPHLETS AND WORKBOOKS

Scouts can review requirements and learn more about each merit badge from the individual Merit Badge Pamphlets (which contain the information a Scouts needs to learn about the topic or subject of the Merit Badge) and/or a Merit Badge Workbook (which lists the requirements and provides space for the Scout to fill in the material he is required to learn/discuss with the counselor).

Merit badge pamphlets are available from many of the Patrol Advisers, or Mr. Diamond or Mr. Lavine. Several can be accessed online until such time as you have a chance to purchase the book at the Scout Store or borrow a printed copy (search for the merit badge name and "pamphlet PDF").

LIST OF MERIT BADGES

The following 17 badges are on the list of badges in requirement 3 for Eagle Scout.

Although a Scout must earn only 13 of them for the rank of Eagle Scout, and certain of them are therefore options for others, a Scout may choose any combination of these 16 merit badges to fulfill requirement number 3 for Star and Life Scout. (He must have a minimum of 4 of these badges for Star and a minimum of 7 of these badges for Life) Click here to see which badges in the list are options. The new Sustainability merit badge is an alternative to Environmental Science. Effective on January 1, 2014, COOKING merit badge has been added as a 13th required badge for Eagle, and 17th badge on the list.
